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Groups on Oct. 22, 2005 in Sarasota. This is a one-day meeting, with continental breakfast and lunch included, for \$20. Learning how to maintain an active club and what others are doing will be beneficial to our members.

We are still settling into our new meeting place, and it was decided to delay a tour of the Pepin site until construction is completed toward the end of the year.

At 7:00 pm, Mary started the regular portion of our meeting by introducing Steve Singer of RDI-Tampa. Steve started by telling us some history of his involvement in supplying computer hardware beginning in 1978 when Apple ruled.

Steve displayed three Jetway motherboards and reflected he prefers AMD hardware to Intel. AMD uses two buses to divide the routing of tasks. Their chips utilize a dual core, which take advantage of the motherboard's split bus for greater speed. The dual core CPU requires a 939 Chip socket and RAM must be filled in pairs, but SDRAM PC 100 and 133 can be utilized. Steve pointed out that the emphasis on chip speed has been redirected toward the dual core chips, as faster and faster chips were generating too much heat.

Steve offered an external disk drive case for housing a notebook hard drive for \$35. He also demonstrated a portable two channel USB speaker system by Encore Electronics, featuring a 2" subwoofer and two 1" satellite speakers with self contained amplifier, for \$29.95.

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The Newsletter and Me I have been doing the newsletter one month short of 10 years. That makes 119 issues of the newsletter, all, if I am not mistaken, produced on time (arriving in your mail before the monthly meeting). And for every one of those newsletters, there is an Adobe Acrobat version. In December of 1995, I took over the job from someone who was burned out, and I would not be adverse to now yielding the job to someone else. I have been thinking of creating a CD with all the Adobe Acrobat files along with a searchable index. It would be sort of a history of what we were doing in computing for the past 10 years. To fill up all that empty space I mentioned, let's look inside some of those issues.

Ten years of the *Bits of Blue*

In that December 1995 issue, Larry Anders had a review of *Street Atlas USA 3.0*. I assume if they were still numbering the product in that manner we would now be on version 13 since they put out a new version each year. However, I note that the product is now called *Street Atlas USA 2006*. Also in that issue the president of the group, Harvey Bruneau, described his recent trip to COMDEX in Las Vegas. Changing times killed that event, which used to be enormous. There were also reviews of *Adobe Photoshop 3.0* and *Lotus SmartSuite for OS/2* copied from other user group newsletters. I don't think there are any new OS/2 programs out there at the moment. The newsletter, as it was until recently, was 12 pages, and our meetings were on the Hillsborough Community College campus in Ybor City.

The January 1996 issue had a column from our new president, Connie Kincaid. There were also reviews of *Syncware Fill* by William LaMartin, Seattle Film Works (a business) by Bruce Register, *Zip Explorer* by Larry Anders and *Partition Magic* by Don Patzsch. That was version 1 of Partition Magic. I note that *Zip Explorer* is now on version 7 and *Partition Magic* is at version 8. Remember, you probably heard about them first via the TPCUG.

In the March 1996 issue, I wrote an article about *Microsoft Publisher for Win 95*, as that version was called. That was the first issue I had used *Publisher* to do the newsletter, the previous three issues having been done in *Microsoft Word*. Let me tell you, I found out quickly that a word processor is not the ideal vehi-

cle in which to create a newsletter. I have been using *Publisher* ever since. My current version is *Publisher 2003*. In that issue, Larry Anders wrote about an early version of *PaintShop Pro*. There was an OS/2 article from outside the group. (At that time, I struggled to secure articles about OS/2 since there was a small but active part of the group using OS/2 as their operating system.)

Do you remember *Microsoft Bob*? If not, you can read about him (it?) in the May 1996 article by Tim Condon. The June 1996 issue had a very long article about *OS/2 Merlin*. In the July 1996 issue, we announced our first web site which was hosted by member John Meroth as a subdirectory of his site. It would be a few more months before we got our own domain name of tpcug.org. Remember the Zip Drive from Iomega? Larry Anders wrote about an early one in the August 1996 issue. Iomega is still making Zip Drives but no longer appears to make the parallel interface ones of that era.

In the September 1996 newsletter, I wrote about PC Hell--a topic I would return to not infrequently over the years. The October 1996 issue inaugurated a short-lived column by Will Goble titled *Ask PC Willy*. And again since OS/2 was of interest, Charles Howe had an article on *OS/2 Warp*.

The November 1996 issue has articles about *Delrina CommSuite 95*, of which *WinFax Pro* was one of the components. Faxing from your computer was a big deal back then. There was mention of Internet Explorer 3.0, and it was noted that Netscape was the runaway preference for most of the Internet world. Mention was also made of a beta version of *Microsoft Net Meeting*.

In December 1996, Larry Anders had a review of *Street Atlas 4.0*. (See they had put out their yearly update from 3.0 to 4.0.) And there was mention of our move in February 1997 to a new location for the general meetings to MOSI, the Museum of Science and Industry.

Those are some highlights of my first year of newsletters. And there are nine more years to go, but I will spare you that for now. If you go to our web site, <http://www.tpcug.org>, you will find Adobe Acrobat

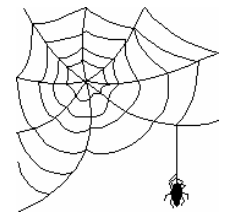

Some Visual Basic .Net Programming

I spend a good bit of my time writing programs using Visual Basic .Net. In past years I used Delphi and Visual Basic. The more I use it, the more I appreciate VB .Net.

In the past month or so, I have written

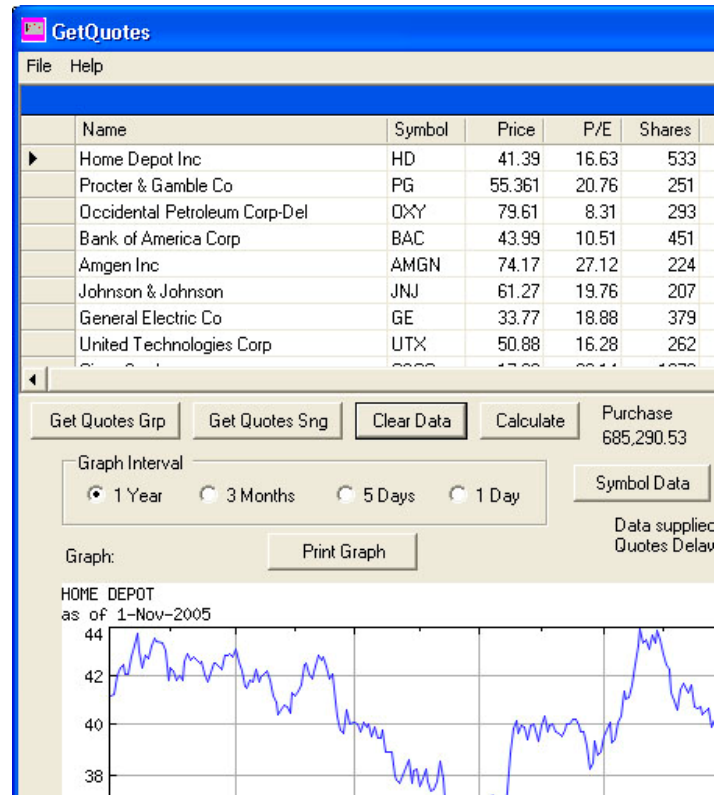
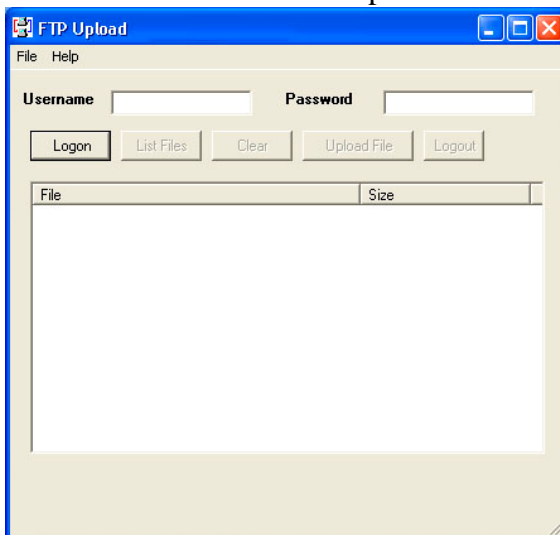
- A bare-bones FTP program
- A Zip and UnZip file program
- A program to parse data from a Telnet session dump and then display it and post it to an online database
- A stock portfolio that retrieves time-delayed quotes and displays the portfolio's current status with individual stock details and graphs.

I am also in the process of using VB .Net in the redo of a web site using ASP.Net technology.

The FTP program was written to satisfy a request from a friend who wanted a simple way for his clients to send files periodically to his server. The clients needed an "idiot-proof" way of doing the file uploads, and telling them to download a shareware FTP program, install it and figure out how to use it was clearly not "idiot-proof." Here is the simple interface of the program. All they need do is supply a username and password, then log on. Once logged on, they then click the Upload File button and select the file to be uploaded from the directory

tree. The file is then automatically sent via FTP to the server and put in the folder associated with that username.

There is no



installation of the program; you simply place the executable on the desktop of any computer that has the .Net Framework installed (if not installed, the .Net Framework can be downloaded from Microsoft and easily installed).

The picture above is the upper left hand portion of the stock portfolio program, displaying the status of a hypothetical portfolio and the one year graph of a selected stock, in this case Home Depot. The stock data is supplied by a free web service that has a 20-minute delay. The graphs are gotten from the Yahoo financial site.

For any stock you select, you can display both a graph for varying lengths of time and its statistical details. This program also needs no installation.

In general, a program will need no installation program if it does not reference any external dlls. To write the Zip and UnZip program, I had to use the SharpZipLib from <http://www.icsharpcode.net>. So this program required an installation program. But the installation program was small and no big deal. At present the program will unzip an archive of zipped

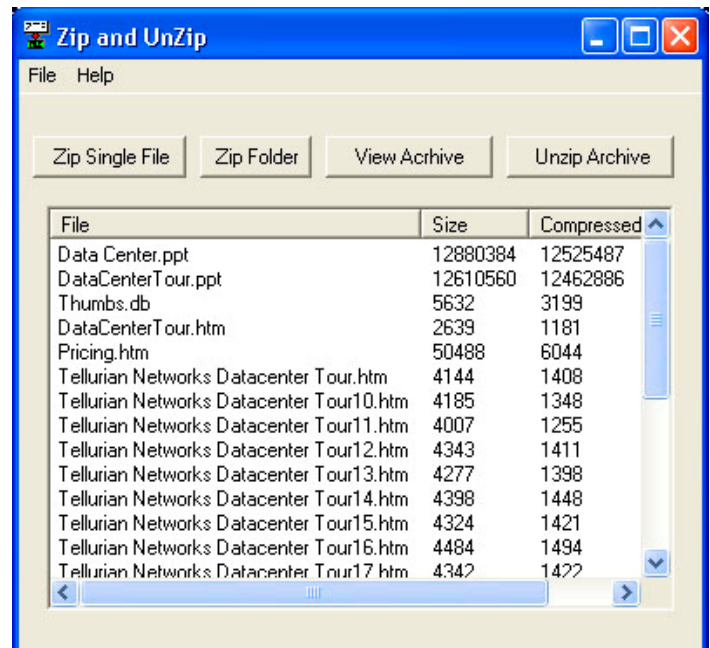

folders within zipped folders to any depth, but will only zip a collection of folders with folders to a depth of 2. I need to come back at some time and write a recursive function to handle that process.

You might rightly ask, why write a program to do something that you can already get done for free. For example, Windows XP will zip and unzip things for you. Well, here is one reason. Say, I wrote a program that as output creates a large file and sends it somewhere using either FTP (as in the earlier example) or HTTP post to put it at a web site. I would like the file to be as small as possible. I could accomplish that by including the zip code within that program so that I zipped the file from within the program before sending it off. The Zip and UnZip interface is at the top of the next column.

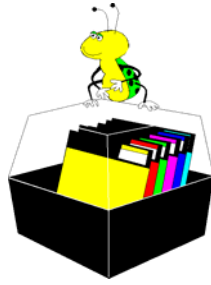
Finally, I'll write briefly about the inventory program. The problem basically was that I needed a way to get data out of a proprietary system that you could only access via a vendor-supplied Windows program which was basically just a wrapper for Telnet. (Remember Telnet, the way you communicated with another computer and viewed the session on a "DOS" screen for which you had to keep pressing Enter to see more data?) About the only thing the program will allow is for you to export the display memory to a text file.

So I wrote a program that opens this text file, parses



out the desired information and displays it in table form. You can then sort based on each column or filter on the values in as many as three columns. You can then save the data as a text file or as an xml file. Finally, the most important thing is that you can press a button and the data will be uploaded to a web service which will then save it to the web site where you want to display the inventory information. The idea is that someone at the business will run this program once a day to update the web site information. And that is the end of my story. ♦
